The College held its first academic year in 1985, under the original name of Maranatha Christian College. The ambitious initiative got off the ground through the leadership and support of Rockingham Baptist Church. The original vision was to provide Christ-centered education to families in the Rockingham region, and this still forms the foundation of our vision today.

SCBC is aligned with the Baptist denomination, which believes in one true God: The Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit. The teachings of the Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments form the doctrinal base. Families do not need to have a Christian faith to attend the College, but must be supportive of the Christian ethos of the school.

In 2012, the College was rebranded to reflect the growth of the college, and its current name launched. Steady growth has meant the College has become better resourced and positioned to help our students thrive. This includes becoming internationally competitive in Physics, our highly successful football programme, and current \$45m redevelopment plan (15-20 year project).

Graduates are encouraged to stay connected to the College and the friends they have made while studying here. We are now at an exciting stage where we are seeing our graduates send their own children through the school, trusting us to provide the same positive school experience they fondly remember.

Secondary



Our Secondary College offers a wide range of engaging courses in Years 7 to 10 that develop students' skills and interests in preparation for Upper Secondary. Lower Secondary students undertake the core subjects of English, Mathematics, Humanities and Social Sciences, as well as Bible and Christian Studies, Languages Other Than English (LOTE), Health Education and Physical Education. Elective subjects include Music, Visual Art, Drama, Food Science Technology, Mathematics Extension, Information Technology, Materials and Design Technology (Metals or Wood), Digital Media and Robotics, STEM Flight, Outdoor Education, Bike Education, Hip Hop Dance, Engineering and the Football Development Program.

From Years 10-12, students are supported in their choice of three Upper Secondary pathways: the University ATAR Pathway, University Non-ATAR Pathway, or the Vocational Pathway. Subjects include English, Human Biology, Mathematics Specialist, Mathematics Applications, Mathematics Methods, Physics, Chemistry, Integrated Science, History, Geography, Engineering Studies, Politics and Law, Outdoor Education, Physical Education Studies, Visual Arts, MDT Metals, MDT Wood, Applied Information Technology, Business Management and Design Photography, ATAR Physical Education Studies, ATAR Geography and General Business Management & Enterprise. All Upper Secondary students also participate in Bible and Christian Studies, Study Skills seminars and Physical Education. Our Vocational Education Program allows students to gain industry experience and recognized qualifications in a range of fields. Our aim is for graduating students to leave with a clear pathway for further education or employment.

Our Secondary students are also able to apply for merit-based placement within specialist programs, including our Football Academy and Gifted and Talented Program.



Primary (Year 1 to Year 6)



Primary School at South Coast Baptist College begins with Kindergarten and goes through to Year 6 with currently over 530 students in the Primary School.

The Early Learning Years (Kindergarten to Year 2) is a sub area within the Primary School and focuses on the Early Years Learning Framework. Primary schooling is an integral part of a child's development and at the College we focus on the development of the whole child, including academics, social, emotional and personal wellbeing through various intentionally executed programs.

Academically, a strong focus is placed on numeracy and literacy skills. Programs in Literacy, Numeracy and all other curriculum areas are sequenced to ensure effective transition between year groups. Each teacher provides differentiation within the classroom and CAP's (Curriculum Adjustment Plans) where required so that each student can reach their full potential. A strong, individualised Learning Support Program is provided for students who require additional academic support.

The West Australian Curriculum is fully implemented across the Primary School (Pre-Primary to Year 6) and classroom lessons, resources and reporting in the Primary School aligns directly to the achievement standards expected for each year level. Technology is widely incorporated into all Primary classrooms. Wireless internet, interactive whiteboards, laptops and iPads are utilized by teachers and students to enhance the education process. Our Primary School delivers a curriculum which includes many specialist areas aimed at developing and improving each child's personal abilities across a wide range of learning areas. Digital Technology, Music, Chinese (Mandarin), Art, Physical Education and Sports Specialisation (football, gymnastics and athletics), Choir, Chess Club and Primary School Musicals are all part of a myriad of co-curricular activities offered in the primary years. It is this breadth of opportunity that provides a truly holistic education for the students in our Primary School.

The Primary School is not only a place for formal learning. It is a place where friendships are made. Our College's four core values mould and develop the character of our students. We prepare each of them for lifelong learning in a caring, supportive Christian environment.

It is a privilege to partner with our parents, to nurture each child entrusted to our care. We provide opportunities for each child to discover their own unique set of God-given gifts as a means to unlocking their true potential. Our culture of engagement and partnership with families creates a distinctly genuine and unique sense of community.

Special events across the Primary school include various excursions, swimming lessons, Presentation Nights, Academic Achievement Awards, Year 6 Graduation, Mother and Father's Day, Book Week with a character dress up day and Year 5 & Year 6 Camps that feature an outdoor adventure itinerary.

Primary (Kindergarten and Pre-Primary)



At SCBC Kindergarten and Pre-primary, we believe in providing a dual approach to education which supports every child to become confident learners. As educators, we recognise the importance of teaching fundamental skills of Literacy and Numeracy while being influenced by the Reggio Emilia approach. This holistic education caters for our students physical, intellectual, emotional, social and spiritual domains. The Principal attended the Reggio Emilia Conference in Reggio Emilia, Italy.

Reggio Emilia understands that all children are unique, strong and capable of constructing and co-constructing their own knowledge and understanding. Best practice asserts that children learn through play and our educators listen to children and plan experiences that foster learning through play. We provide opportunities where educators can be responsive to children's ideas, and link these ideas to extend literacy and numeracy knowledge. Projects provide a pathway for exploring and achieving collaboration and opportunities for children to hypothesize and test their hypothesis, to become more engaged in their learning and participate with much larger intent.

Our classroom environment supports the Reggio approach that sees the environment as critically important. Our qualified and experienced educators provide an environment rich with creative, sensory and intentional learning centres that engage and encourage children to become confident learners.

Our education practice aligns with the Early Years Learning Framework and the National Quality Standards to provide an outstanding educational experience. Pre-Primary is the foundational year for the National Curriculum. Our programming and reporting in Pre-Primary align directly to the teaching of required curriculum. Our facilities are designed to give students a physical environment that is engaging, spacious and functional. Facilities include large purpose-built classrooms, a kitchen, a central learning area and an expansive, fully fenced outdoor play area.

Pre-Primary students receive interim and end of semester reports on their progress throughout the year. Students attend Kindergarten for five full days per fortnight whilst Pre-Primary students attend school full time.



Childcare



All children deserve the best possible start in life. Access to quality early learning services is an essential part of making the most of those initial years, and paving the way for the opportunities that lie ahead in life. The School of Early Learning and Childcare began its journey of aesthetic transformation in 2018. It continues to provide intentionally beautiful environments for our children to flourish.

As well as creating an environment that was intentional and aesthetically pleasing, SCBC's Leadership focused on building a team of highly competent staff. Professional Development is a big part of the growth of our team. A number of our staff members enrolled to further their studies and increase the Centre's capacity to deliver quality care and education. Team leaders had the opportunity to attend a number of early childhood conferences, with keynote speakers from the industry which flowed into practice upon their return. Sharing this knowledge with families through reflections, conversations and leadership news, extended the learnings from our Centre into their homes, providing a link that is imperative for the shared care between our educators and their primary caregivers. We are extremely fortunate and blessed to have such wonderful educators who reflect secure, respectful care and reciprocal relationships with their children, families and members of our College community.

Our Centre is vibrant and diverse. We have many celebrations and events throughout the year. The Harmony Family Picnic was a wonderful evening where our families and College community came together to celebrate inclusiveness, respect and a sense of belonging for everyone. Having such a multicultural Centre, it was wonderful to share a sense of togetherness. We are strong and connected as a community, sharing our cultural heritage throughout the Centre.

In September, our families who utilise our services took the time to say thank you to the educators and caregivers of their children for Early Childhood Educators Day. The same day, other educators in the industry were taking the day off for industrial action. All of our team came to work, and celebrated their profession and achievements with their peers, Leadership Team and families. Our Leadership Team rolled out the red carpet, filled the Centre with colourful balloons, and provided morning tea while families wrote in an individual thank you card. It was absolutely fabulous. It was wonderful that our team were truly recognised and appreciated on Educators Day.

As well as offering a long day care service, before and after school care we also offer a playgroup service. In 2018, a decision was made to offer this service free of charge. Many families have joined our playgroup and it is a thriving part of our service. Before and after school care remains an integral part for our community, as our College works together to ensure working families have access to all day education opportunities. A huge variety of engaging activities from art, craft and cooking to sports, our Vacation Care program was a hit this year, helping children to build their independence and encourage individual personalities to shine.

Community feedback is an integral part of ensuring we are working with the needs of the community. This year surveys were sent out to families asking them what their needs were. A high number of families required earlier opening hours, and after consultation with the College, our Centre hours changed to suit the requirements of the working families.

As Childcare is the opening pathway of care for the College, our team is entrusted with a profoundly important period of our children's life. We are extremely blessed for our colleagues at the College who working closely with our service in enriching our team with knowledge, solidifying relationships, exchanging information to ensure our children who become their students, experience a purposeful, engaging educational journey. Inspired by God, our College continually draws on each other strengths to ensure our School of Early Learning Childcare, delivers a quality care and education.

Music, Drama & Arts



The Arts have the capacity to engage, inspire and enrich students to reach their creative and expressive potential. The Arts program at SCBC is in line with the Australian Curriculum and is informative, modern and industry relevant. Our programs feature exciting and informative practices that inspire and equip students according to their future aspirations.

In Drama, students enjoy a variety of activities that include improvisation, drama games, interpreting scripts and studying aspects of theatre production, such as costuming, stage managing, sound and lighting. In Visual Art, students engage with a range of media and materials, including ceramics, painting and print making. Music plays a significant role in the College and has helped students to grow their confidence through performing music not only to their peers but also to the wider community. A highlight of the Secondary term are the 'Music on the Green' lunchtime concerts, where students perform for the College community. These events allow our budding musicians to develop their performance skills in a safe and nurturing environment.

In Secondary school, music is project based with students working towards performances as a group. There are three main parts to each project; preparation, process and performance. The preparation phase involves teaching music theory, aural identification, terminology, song selection and expression appropriate for performance. In the process phase, students learn by rehearsing in a group, receiving feedback and then trying again. This phase takes the largest amount of class time. In the last phase, students perform at an event; school concert, lunchtime concert, assembly or via recording in class. Students are mainly assessed on their week-to-week progress in the process phase. In Years 9 and 10, the assessment focus shifts from basic rhythm, pitch and form to the stylistic features of each song.

Pre-Primary Reggio Inspired Learning

In Science, we have been delving deeper into our understanding of living and non-living things by learning about seasons and how the weather impacts living things. Students have explored the temperature changes and how this influences clothing and animals' reactions to seasons; such as gathering food in Autumn, hibernation or migration in Winter, reproducing in Spring, and growing in Summer. Students have also researched and observed the changes that occur in plants and trees. Students displayed their knowledge by painting our doorway to represent the four seasons, creating their favourite season tree out of clay and beads, as well as many other ways. Being inspired by Reggio has helped our Pre-Primary students demonstrate their knowledge using their 100 languages, whether it be art, discussions or creation. This lets their God given unique talents and gifts flourish and inspires their learning.

"Our school community is like a beautiful quilt; lives pieced together; stitched with smiles and tears, coloured with memories and bound by the love of God".


Music - Count Us In

Students learned about line, pattern, and texture and the life of Claude Monet who was a French Impressionist painter. Year 5 and 6 students explored the techniques of "Op Art" and they made some mesmerising artworks. All art students have been learning about using texture in their artworks this semester. 


If a student is absent from a teaching instruction day and there has been no reasonable explanation provided by a parent or guardian, a mobile text message is sent to the parent or guardian before morning recess (10:10am for Primary and 10:40am for Secondary) on the day of the absence, asking them to provide a reason. If a response to the mobile text message has not been received by 11:00am.

If no response is received, an email is sent to the parent/guardian via SEQTA, advising of the student's absence from the College requesting an explanation. If an email response has not been received regarding the unresolved absence, a letter is posted home asking for an explanation (See Daily SMS Procedure & Weekly Absentee Follow-up Procedure).

If a student is absent for a significant amount of school with no reasonable explanation, Student Services will notify the Deputy Head of Primary (Wellbeing) and Head of Primary or the Deputy Head of Secondary (Wellbeing), Year Manager (Secondary) and the Head of Secondary.



Parent Survey

<u>Secondary Parent Survey – Online Learning</u>

2020 presented a new challenge for schools, with the COVID-19 pandemic requiring a transition to online learning. Following the first weeks of online learning, Secondary surveyed parents to receive feedback on the success of this transition. The results were positive:

- 67% of parents satisfied with the amount of work assigned for their children over this period;
- 85% indicated that their children engaged well with the online learning provided for their child:
- 75% stated that their child required little or no assistance from parents to engage in their learning;
- 67% felt well informed and supported throughout the entire online learning period; and
- 85% of parents were likely or very likely to recommend South Coast Baptist College on the basis of the online learning provided to their children.

Student Survey

Secondary – Friendship and Loneliness Survey

In Term 3, students in Years 7 - 11 participated in the Friendship and Loneliness survey. This survey is a longitudinal study over four years where data is collected from the same group of students. UWA will give the College access to the data they collect, as well as to the app they will develop for student use.

Primary – Student Mental Health

KidsMatter was a mental health framework targeted at Primary School students. This has been superseded by a program called 'Be You'. It contains much of the same content but has been updated to include early childhood all the way through to Secondary. In the Primary School our KidsMatter team will become the 'Be You' Team. The team met each Term to discuss and plan for mental health initiatives that benefit students and staff. Students completed a survey which focus on student mental health and wellbeing.

Staff Survey

Principal – Staff Strategic Plan Survey

A series of meetings were held to further clarify and establish our reason for being (purpose), including the constructs that help define our faith, character and related service delivery. The series of interactive meetings has included reconnecting with the original mission and staff helping to identify priority goals as per the current Strategic Plan. College staff reflected on our strengths and helped to build a future picture for 2021+.

<u>Secondary – Pivot Survey</u>

In 2020 our Secondary school trialled the Pivot Survey as a tool for receiving pedagogical performance feedback. This survey is fully aligned with AITSL standards and provides teachers with direct feedback from students on their teaching. The surveys provide teachers with a range of reports providing them with targeted data on which to base their professional learning goals.

The survey allows individual teachers to see their average score for each AITSL standard from all classes, how the teacher's individual score compares to an all-staff average for that standard, and their average score for each question. As teachers complete the Pivot selfassessment, they can also see how their own estimation of their performance compares with their students' assessment against each standard.

Heads of Department can also view a range of data including the department average score per standard and question. The data per year group view enables useful data for identifying any engagement issues, whole of Secondary professional learning foci, and also allows staff to celebrate positive feedback on programs.

Into the future, Pivot Surveys will be a regular component of teacher reflections and professional development processes.


NAPLAN Results


Was NAPLAN 2020 cancelled or delayed until 2021? Will students in Years 4, 6, 8 or 10 do NAPLAN in 2021? +

Education ministers made the decision to cancel NAPLAN in 2020 due to the COVID-19 pandemic. This means students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9 in 2020 did not undertake the assessment in 2020 and will not do a 'catch-up' test in 2021. Those in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9 in 2021 will sit the NAPLAN assessments. Any change to this and to the year levels that participate in the annual NAPLAN assessments would need to be agreed by all education ministers.

Year 12 Results

ATAR Results

In 2020, Year 12 students achieved consistently as expected with 47 out of 51 students achieving a WACE Certificate. This was a 6% improvement in WACE attainment compared to 2019, an overall positive outcome. It was very pleasing to see our students achieve consistently well in their ATAR exams in 2020, despite the impact of the pandemic on learning time spent in the classroom, and the effect of students receiving early offers from university which had the potential to dampen student effort and performance.

Daniel M achieved the top ATAR score of **98.65** followed by Leah B with a very credible **95.75**. The school median ATAR was 2 points down from 2019 (and 3 points below the State median) although this was expected, based on predictions tracking student performance over the past two years.

Nevertheless, this was a positive achievement when compared with results from 2012 onwards. Of note, 50% of our students achieved ATAR scores over 80, thereby ranking in the top 20% of all W.A graduates to qualify for university. The absence of anomaly scores (lower than 55) is observed to be an outcome of good guidance.

Mannafest Trailer

After growing his hair long for more than two years, Conan had his head shaved in front of the Assembly, with the footage being live streamed to the rest of the Secondary cohort. Students supported Conan by making a gold coin donation and coming to school in a free dress, raising more than \$400 for leukemia research. Sacrificing his hair to raise money for cancer research was a demonstration of the values we are aiming to instill in our students. His grit (in terms of not worrying about his appearance) and love for others were on full display.



Secondary Rite Journey

Our Year 9 students are provided with an opportunity to participate in The Right Journey program that forms part of our mission of shaping Rigorous Minds, Compassionate Hearts. One of our Year 9 students, Morgan Has, chose to raise awareness and fundraising for 'Share the Dignity Project' to help women who are homeless, fleeing domestic violence or 'doing it tough'. Salvation Army Rockingham

Our Secondary students and staff visited Salvation Army Rockingham and spoke to members of the homeless community as part of a unique STEAM project. One group of Year 8 students put down their impression of the lives of the community in Art lessons. <u>Debate Win</u>

the Gifted and Talented Programme entered two teams into the inter-regional debating competition. A Year 8 team and a Year 9 team. Both Teams performed very well and earned the honours of completing in the finals. Our Novice Team made up of four Year 8 students made it to the Semi-Finals where they put on the debate of the tournament and narrowly missed out on progressing by 2 points. Our Junior Team, made up of four Year 9 students, won their Semi-Finals but unfortunately lost by 1 point in the Grand Final. Students learned valuable communication and life skills throughout the debate that will serve them well both in and outside the classroom.



Tournament of the Minds

We entered two teams from Year 6 into the Tournament of Minds Competition for the first time ever. Tournament of Minds is a State, National, and International Competition that challenges students to develop problem-solving skills. Tournament of Minds teaches students real world skills as it looks beyond traditional academic achievement as it encourages the pursuit of excellence with no boundaries. This year there were over 1,800 teams who competed nationwide with 120 teams who competed from Western Australia from 60 different schools. This year the tournament was a little different due to COVID-19 restrictions and teams were tasked with creating a 5-minute video that demonstrated a creative solution to an open-ended problem. Both our teams that entered created interesting and dynamic videos that they should both be proud of. One of our teams that entered received the highest honour available being awarded a distinction that places them in the top 10 Teams that competed.



Harmony Day

Harmony Day is a day that celebrates Australia's cultural diversity. It's about inclusiveness, respect and a sense of belonging for everyone. Originally we would have been together as usual on the Primary Basketball Court celebrating Harmony Day by singing the song "Everyone belongs". Due to the current health warnings in place, we had to cancel the event. But music is such a powerful medium to bring people together figuratively speaking. So all students stayed with their own classroom and from a distance, we united to show our unity as a Primary School.

We rose above the dire circumstances we are living in and joined our voices to strengthen our bond. We were told not to socialise. We were told to not get too close to others. But they said nothing about singing together in our own separate spaces to lift the spirits of our community.
